Reading

- Reader's Theater: This activity is a great way to practice reading aloud and fluency. Students read a short script together, with each student taking on a different role. The class can then discuss the story and the characters.
- Storytelling: This activity is a great way to practice storytelling skills and creativity. Students can work in pairs or small groups to create and tell their own stories.


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
